

# Colorado State Fact Sheet

As the data below show, Hispanics<sup>+</sup> are quickly becoming a population with a national presence. The most dramatic Latino population growth has occurred in "nontraditional" states, and Hispanics are now the largest minority in the country. Given that almost half of Hispanics are under 25 years old, they will constitute a large segment of the future U.S. population, workforce, and electorate.

## Colorado Compared to the Nation

- Colorado is the state with the ninth-largest Latino population.<sup>1</sup>
- → Between 1990 and 2000, the growth rate of the Latino population in Colorado ranked 29<sup>th</sup> in the country.<sup>1</sup>
- Of all states, Colorado has the sixth-largest share of Latinos when compared to the total state population.<sup>1</sup>

## **Economic Well-Being**

 Latinos make a significant contribution to the labor force, representing an increasing share of workers and taxpayers, yet they are overwhelmingly vulnerable to economic downturns and experience high poverty rates, especially among working families with children.







#### Education

 Hispanic children are a growing segment of the public school population. In particular, the state has experienced dramatic growth in the Hispanic student population over the last decade.

 Despite high work participation rates, a significant proportion of the Latino population is uninsured and does not benefit from either private or public insurance.
