METHODOLOGY

On behalf of NCLR, Latino Decisions interviewed a total of 1,000 Latino registered voters between October 12-19, 2016. Interviews were conducted in English or Spanish, according to the respondent's choice. Surveys were completed using a blended sample that included live telephone interviews on landlines and cell phones, and online surveys. The overall survey carries a margin of error of +/- 3.1 percentage points.
