Latino Unemployment Rate Inches Up After Four-Month Decline



## **RETAIL TRADE ADDS MOST JOBS IN MARCH**

Retail trade added more jobs than any other sector—48,000 jobs—in March 2016. Growth occurred in general merchandise stores, health and personal care stores, building materials stores, and automobile dealers. Latinos represent nearly 17% of the retail trade workforce and comprise 16% of the total workforce.

## The Employment Situation for Latino Workers in March 2016

The U.S. Department of Labor <u>reported today</u> that U.S. employers added 215,000 jobs in March 2016, down from 245,000 in the previous month. Modest job growth led to a nearly unchanged national unemployment rate of 4.9% in the previous two months to 5% in March. The Latino unemployment rate increased slightly from 5.4% in February to 5.6% in March after a slow but steady four-month decline. The number of unemployed Latinos inched up even as the number of employed Latinos increased. This could be due, in part, to previously discouraged workers seeking work as steady job growth creates a greater demand for workers.
