

Proportion of Projected New Population Growth Composed of New Immigrants and their U.S.-Born Descendents, 2005-2050



U.S. Uninsured Population by Nativity and Citizenship, 2007





Three in five undocumented immigrants (59%)



Uninsured Noncitizens by Family Type, 2007



Noncitizen children are about three times as likely (34.4%) as U.S.-born citizen children (10.1%) to be uninsured.

Noncitizens



Citizen children in mixedstatus families—where at least one parent is an immigrant—are vulnerable to uninsurance.

Undocumented immigrant parents



Although noncitizens are likely to lack health coverage, they are actually less likely than citizens to visit emergency rooms.

People Reporting Emergency Room Visits in Previous Year by Citizenship and Age, 2006





Insured immigrants' health care costs are also lower than insured citizens'.



Recent immigrants make up 5% of the nonelderly adult population, but only 2% of adults' total health care costs—making their share disproportionately low.
