Latino Unemployment Rate Changes Little Employers Add 156,000 Jobs

MANUFACTURING LEADS JOB GROWTH



Manufacturing employment rose by 36,000 in August. Job gains occurred in motor vehicles and parts, fabricated metal parts, and computer and electronic products. Within the industry, Latinos are overrepresented in lower-wage manufacturing occupations such as productions workers and helpers, where the average hourly wage is \$13.58.

The Employment Situation for Latino Workers in August 2017

The U.S. Department of Labor reported that employers added 156,000 jobs in August, lower than gains for the last four months which hovered near or over 200,000. Nevertheless, the number of jobs created in August has historically been low. The national unemployment rate increased slightly by 0.1% from 4.3% in July to 4.4% in August. The small jump in unemployment could be attributed to an increase in workers who either completed temporary jobs or involuntarily left their jobs, but are seeking work. The Latino unemployment rate also increased by 0.1%, from 5.1% in July to 5.2% in August. Over the past four months, the number of Latinos who are unemployed but seeking work has been stubbornly stuck at around 1.4 million.
