About the Survey

Total N=15,200 registered voters (+/- 0.8%)—5300 Latinos (+/- 1.4%)

- Representative samples: Latino, African American, AAPI, Native American and White voters
- State samples: AZ, CA, CO, FL, GA, MI, NC, NV, OH, PA, TX, WI


Field Dates: October 23 - November 2, 2020

- Screen already voted, certain voted
- Blended sample, % online, % live telephone interviews
- Language according to respondent preference: English, Spanish, Chinese Mandarin, Chinese Cantonese, Korean, Tagalog, Vietnamese, Hmong






Latino Presidential Vote by State

In the election for President, did you vote for the Democratic candidate Joe Biden, Republican candidate Donald Trump or someone else?




Presidential Latino Vote by Subgroup

Presidential Latino Vote by National Origin





Closer Look at Arizona—Potential Flip


Precincts with high concentrations of Latino voters show:

- Over 75% support for Biden in Maricopa County
- 80% support for Biden in Pima County
- 74% support for Biden in Yuma County



Precincts Philadelphia County, PA




Vote Share, Dallas County

(43% reporting)




House Vote by State

In the election for U.S. Senate, did you vote for the Democratic candidate or the Republican candidate?




REFERENDUM ON TRUMP



Referendum on Donald Trump - COVID

Overwhelmingly, Latino voters say that Trump ignored the early warning signs of Coronavirus.

Latinos see COVID a threat and nearly 70% strongly support a national mandate to wear masks in public.




Racial Division

Over the past four years, do you think racism and discrimination against your community/racial and ethnic minorities has increased, stayed about the same, or decreased?

Addressing racial issues is a top priority for Latinos.

After four years of a Trump administration, 6 in 10 Latinos believe racism has increased (62%).

Spanish-speaking Latinos are especially likely to indicate racism and discrimination has increased 57%




Top Issue Priorities

COVID is the top priority issue for Latinos.

While immigration is not as salient in previous years, Latinos have taken note of the rise in racism and discrimination toward immigrant and POC communities, which emerges as 4th top issue.

Addressing discrimination and racial justice is especially important for young Latinos 18-29 (24%)


COVID Economic Impact

Latinos have been disproportionately economically impacted by the pandemic.

Latino households have lost work or income (lay off, pay cut, closing their business) due to the pandemic.

* 1 in 4 Latino voters are currently unemployed and looking for work

Percent of households that experienced a job loss, pay cut, and/or closed a business they own due to the pandemic.



Prevalence and Proximity to COVID among Latinos


About one in ten (9%) of households report at least one person in the home contracted coronavirus.

One in three (29%) have one or more friends or acquaintances who have/had it.

One in four (26%) have family members, outside the household, who have gotten coronavirus.



Strong Support for Economic Stimulus



Enthusiasm over Woman of Color as VP


Did Joe Biden's selection of Kamala Harris as his running mate make you more or less enthusiastic about voting for him, or did it not make a difference?



Voting to represent and support community


Clear referendum on Trump and Republican candidates and strong support for Democrats.

Latinos also used their vote to show support and represent the Latino community.




Perceptions of Candidates – Biden Outreach


Perceptions of Candidates – Trump Outreach



Voter Outreach and Contact


Over the past few months, did anyone from a campaign, political party, or a community organization contact you to ask you to vote, or register to vote?



Voter Outreach and Contact


Who was it that asked you to vote, or to register and vote?



Immigration Policy Priorities

Immigration reform holds as a top policy priority among Latinos.


Support for path to citizenship holds strong, though putting an end to the family separation policy shows greater intensity and urgency as a priority for Latinos



Strong Support for Police Reform


Latinos have seen a rise in discrimination against immigrant, Black, and Latino communities over the last four years.

There is strong solidarity and support for addressing police violence and holding law enforcement accountable.



Coronavirus Response

Latinos want to see a national Coronavirus response and support a mask mandate to control COVID propagation.



Takeaways

1. Latinos and voters of color were critical to Biden's success.

- Latino voters drove Biden's margin in key states like Arizona, Michigan, and Wisconsin.

3. Latinos are dealing with devastating health and economic effects from the pandemic.

- COVID dominates issue priorities (health care costs, jobs, unemployment). Economic stimulus package is urgent and necessary.
- Immigration and racial justice follow as issue priorities, strong support for immigration and police reform.

3. Gender, geography, and national origin complicate our understanding of minority voters

- Miami is 3.1% of the national Latino vote.
- Arizona is 3.8% of the national Latino vote

4. Media Narratives driven by one county in each of two states wildly misrepresents facts on the ground.

- Had only Latinos voted, the election would be a blow out. AND, VP Biden would have won Florida.

5. Both parties have points of demonstrable weakness with Latinos. Both parties also have opportunity for vote growth if they can provide policy outcomes that matter to the group.


