Below is a list of current legislation introduced during the Florida 2023 session that UnidosUS, the country's largest Hispanic* civil rights organization, has taken an official position on. Bills are organized by issue area. Legislation with a \checkmark are bills UnidosUS supports as they will provide a positive impact to our community. Legislation with \checkmark are bills we oppose because of their harmful effect on Latino Floridians.



Education

We advocate for policies and programs that provide Latinos and English language learners with high-quality education from early childhood through college and beyond.
