SURVEY OF LATINO VOTERS IN TEXAS

About the Survey

- Total N=3,037 Latino eligible voters
 - N= 2,707 registered
 - N= 330 eligible, not registered
 - Margin of error +/- 1.8%
- Oversamples
 - N=300 per: Arizona, California, Texas, Nevada, North Carolina, Pennsylvania (+/- 5.7%)
 - N=400 Florida, Texas (+/- 4.9%)
- Field Dates: Nov 2 - 13, 2023
- English or Spanish, according to preference
- Mixed mode: 75% online, 25% live telephone interviews

Key Findings

1. Top issue priorities among Latinos in Texas are consistent with Latino voters across the country: inflation, jobs/economy, health care, crime/gun violence, and immigration.

- Food and basic necessities, housing/rent, gas and health insurance costs are the big issues driving concern about inflation
- Jobs/economy concerns are largely focused on the need for better pay, with some worry about benefits and possible layoffs
- Health care costs, particularly health insurance premiums, co-pays, and deductibles are the big factors that weigh on Latino voters when it comes to this issue. Consistent with that concern, 81% of Latino voters (continue to) support Medicaid expansion in Texas (one of 10 states not adopting the program).
- When it comes to crime, ease of access to guns and mass shootings were cited most often as the crime issues that concern them most.

2. Immigration remains a priority issue in Texas, ranking 5th in the top-issues list.

- Providing a path to citizenship for Dreamers and other immigrants with long-standing ties in the country are the and Dreamers are the two big policies Latino voters want to see advanced on this issue.
- There little support for mass deportation or wall-building along the U.S.-Mexico border.

Key Findings

3. Latino voters in Texas see Democrats as more aligned with their values and views, on a host of issues including health care, public education, and treating people with dignity and respect. Yet the majority of Latino voters in the state don't feel that either party truly cares about the Latino community.

4. Looking forward to the 2024, challengers to Senator Ted Cruz, and President Biden hold a substantial polling lead among Texas's Latino electorate at this very early stage.

- Senator Ted Cruz trails both of his potential Democratic rivals in his race, where Congressman Colin Allred has a 20-point lead over Cruz, and State Senator Roland Gutierrez leads Cruz by a 23-points.
- President Biden out-performs his approval rating (46% approve) in potential 2024 match-ups, where he holds a 18-point lead over former President Trump, and a 27-point lead over Florida Governor DeSantis.

5. In 2024, 25% of Latinos in Texas will be voting in their first presidential election

- 20% for the first time in ANY federal election
- Another 14% voted for the first time in 2020
- 38% of the Texas Latino electorate is new since Hillary Clinton and Donald Trump faced off in 2016.

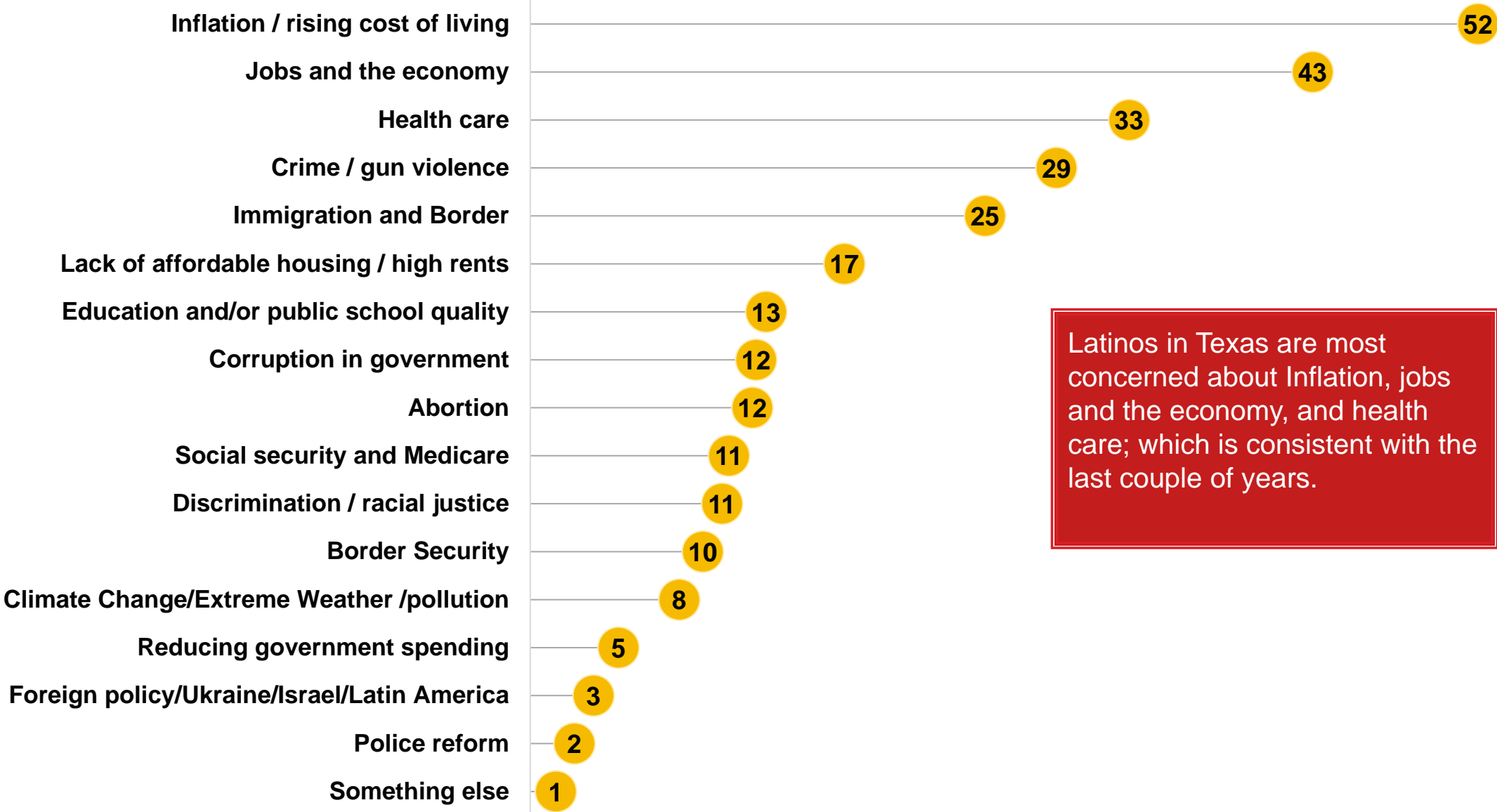

What are the most important issues that elected officials should address?

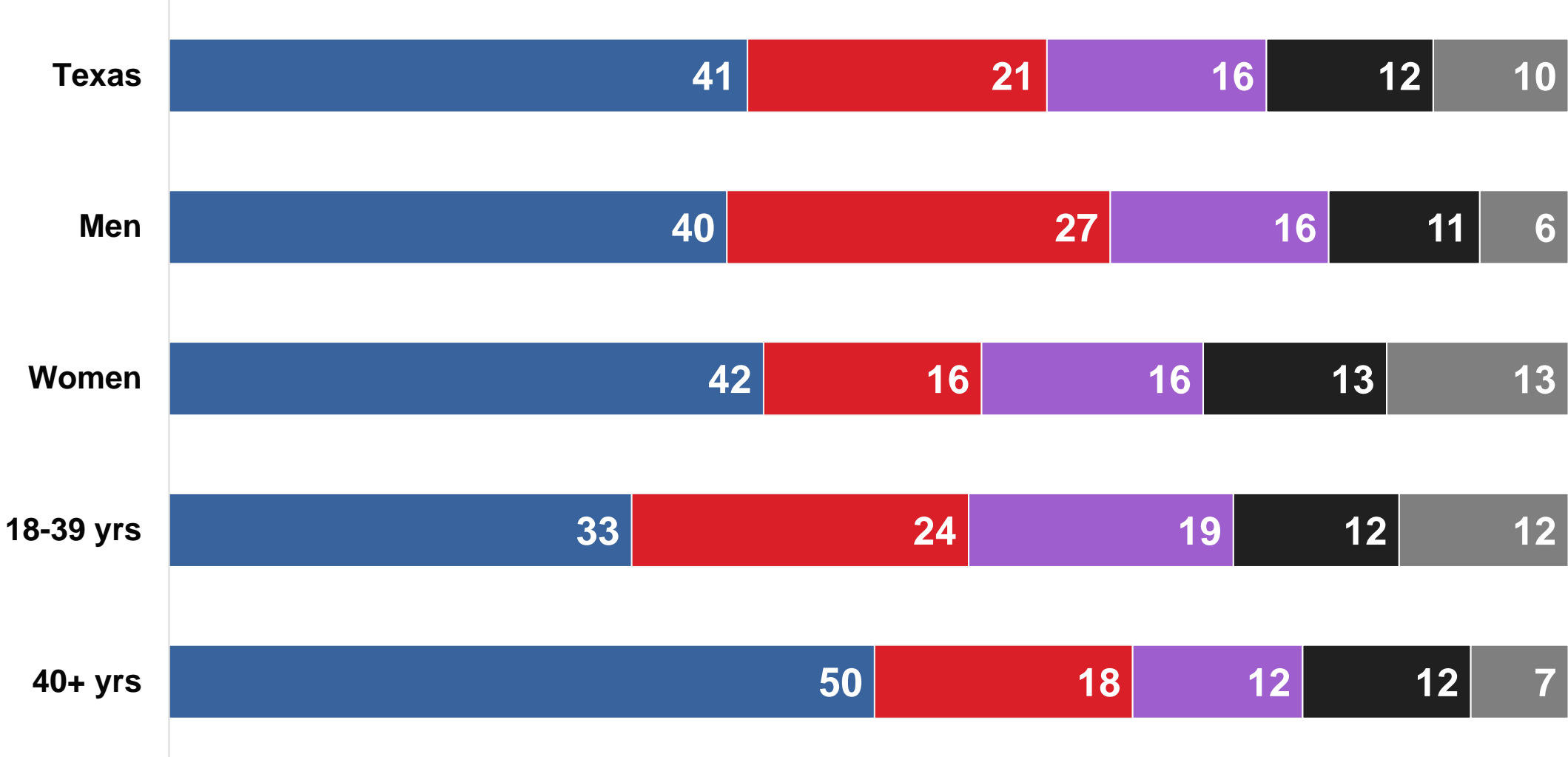

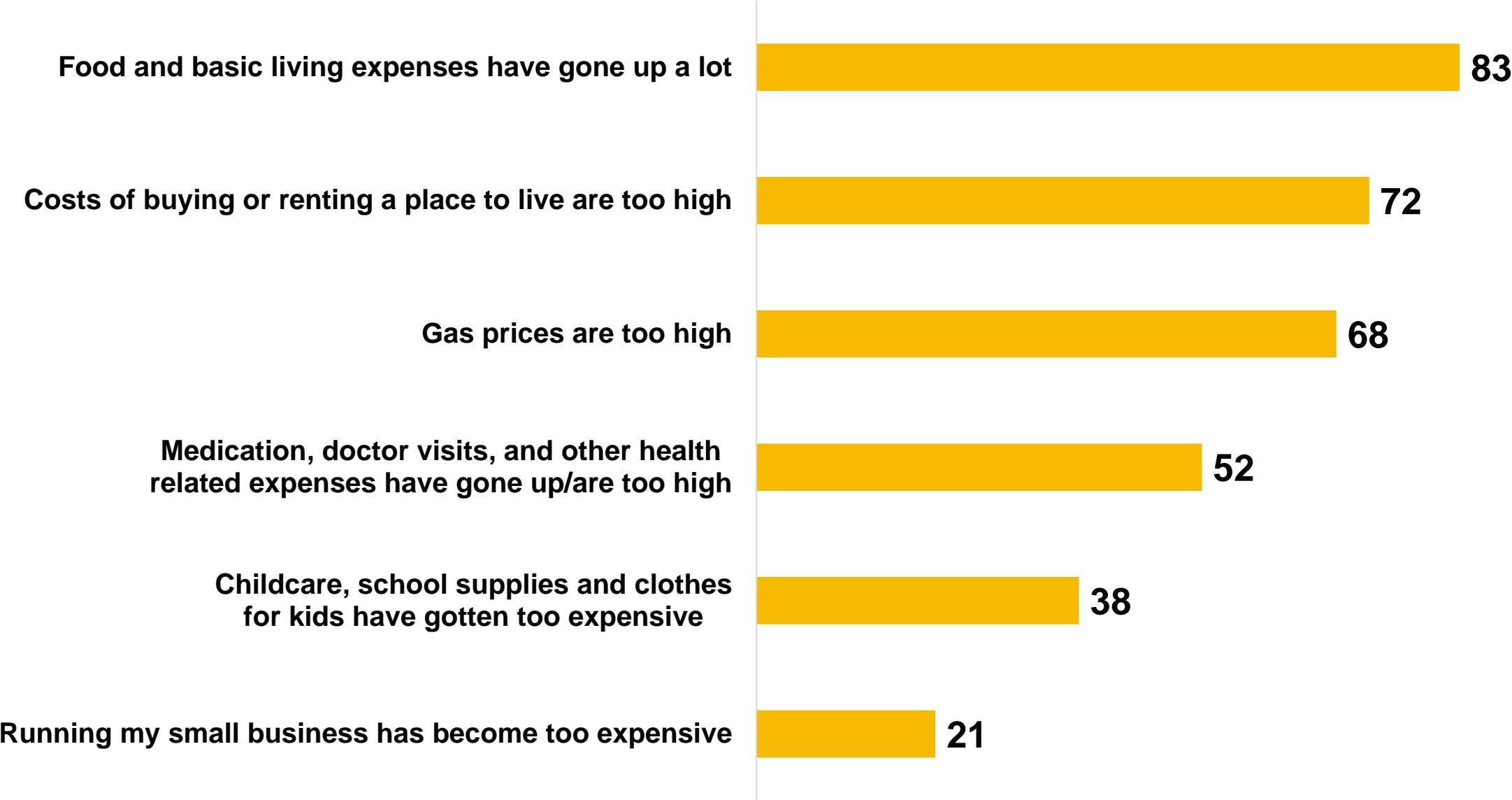
Latinos in Texas are most concerned about Inflation, jobs and the economy, and health care; which is consistent with the last couple of years.

■ Democrats better on issue ■ Republicans better on issue ■ Both would be good on issue ■ Neither good on issue ■ Don't know

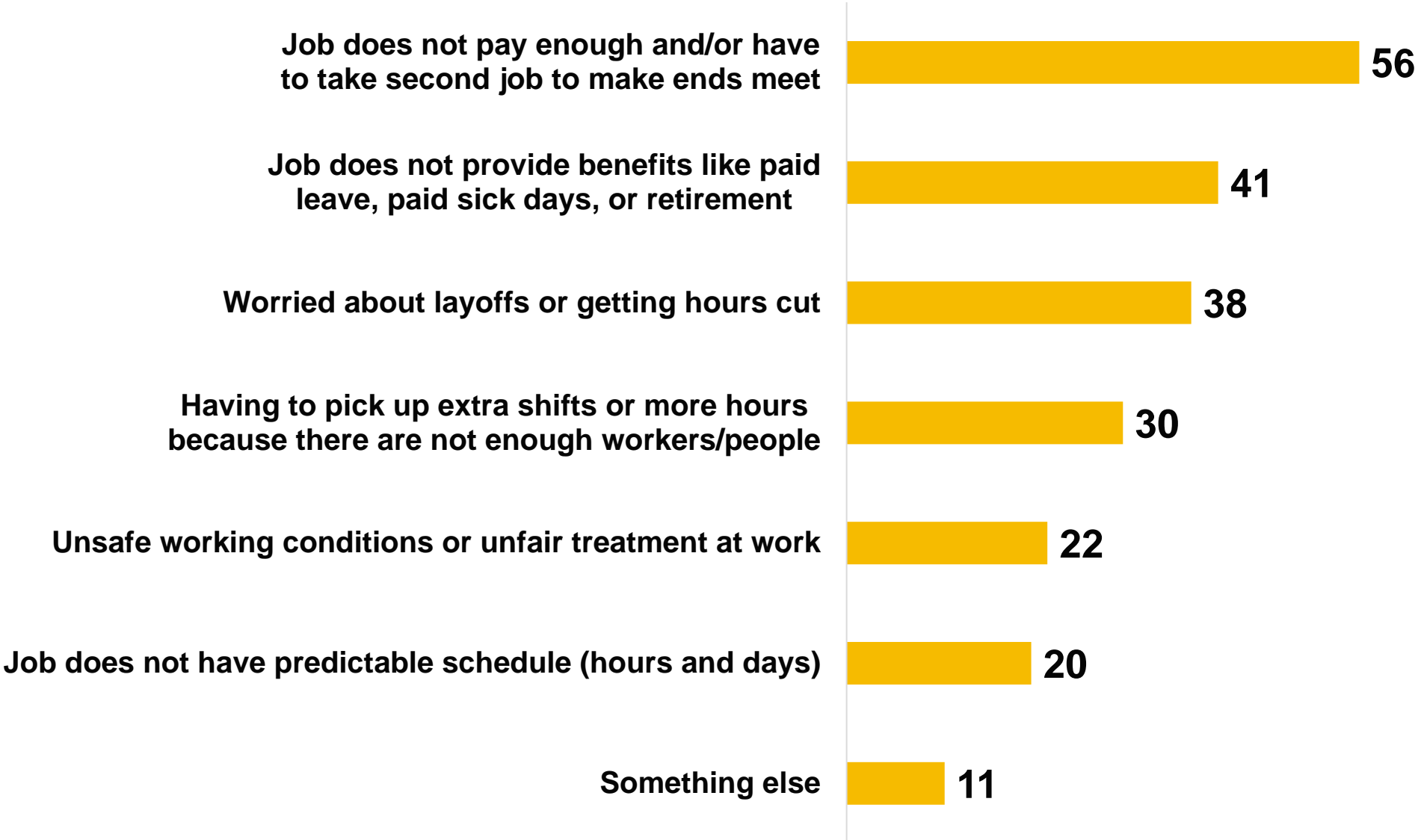


What did you have in mind when you said *inflation and the rising cost of living* are important issues elected officials should address? (all that apply)

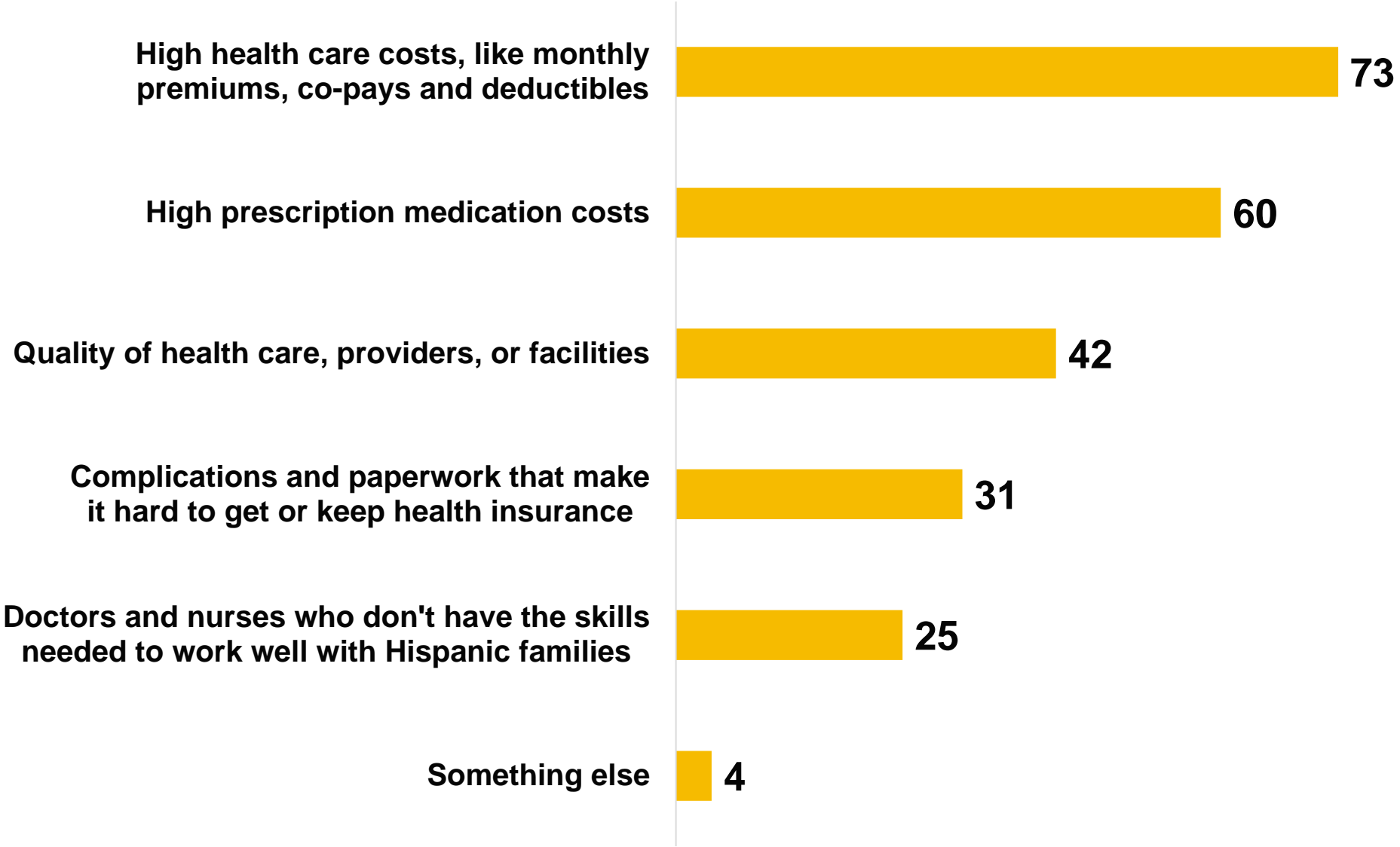

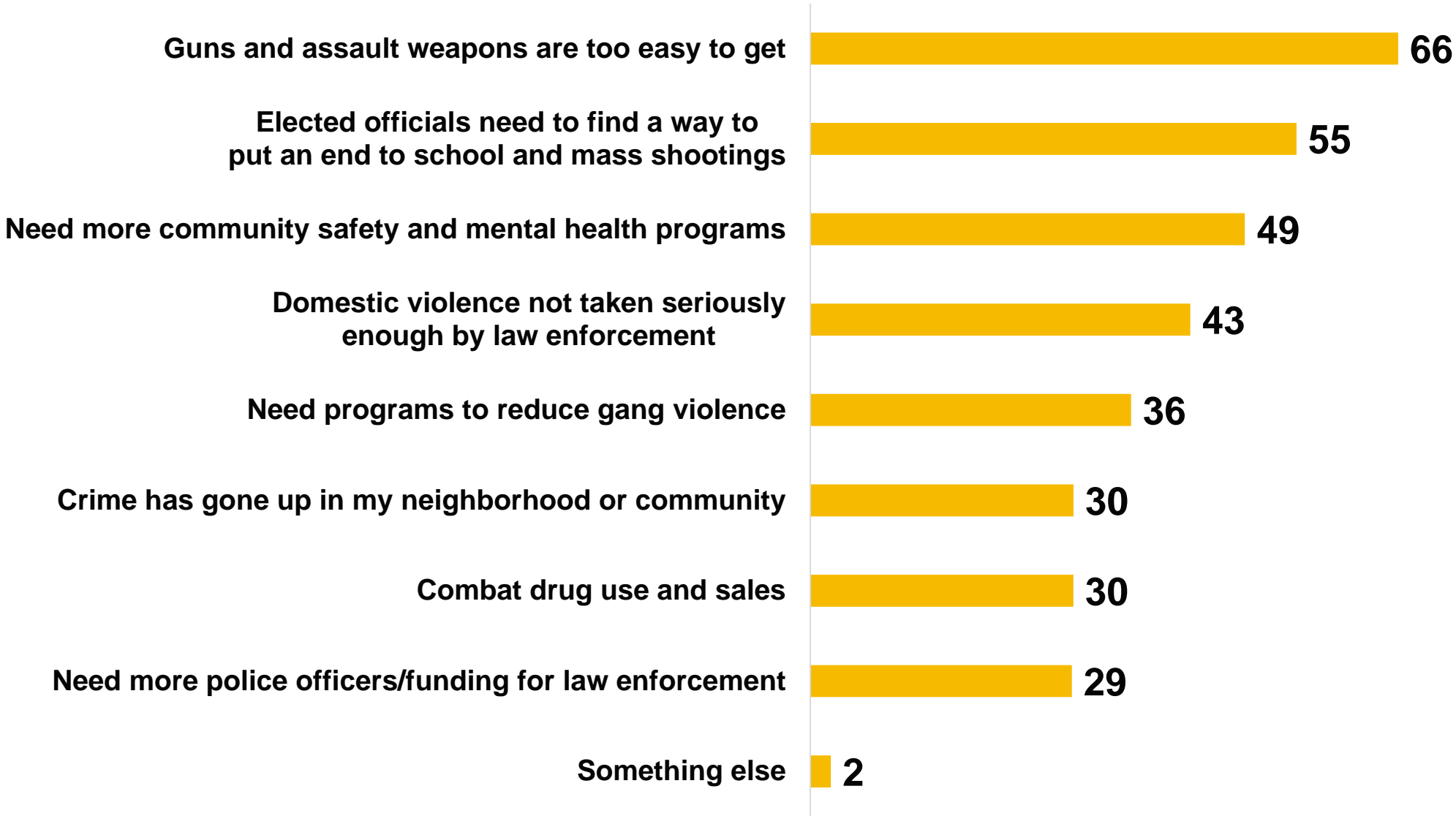
What did you have in mind when you said *jobs and the economy* are important issues elected officials should address? (all that apply)



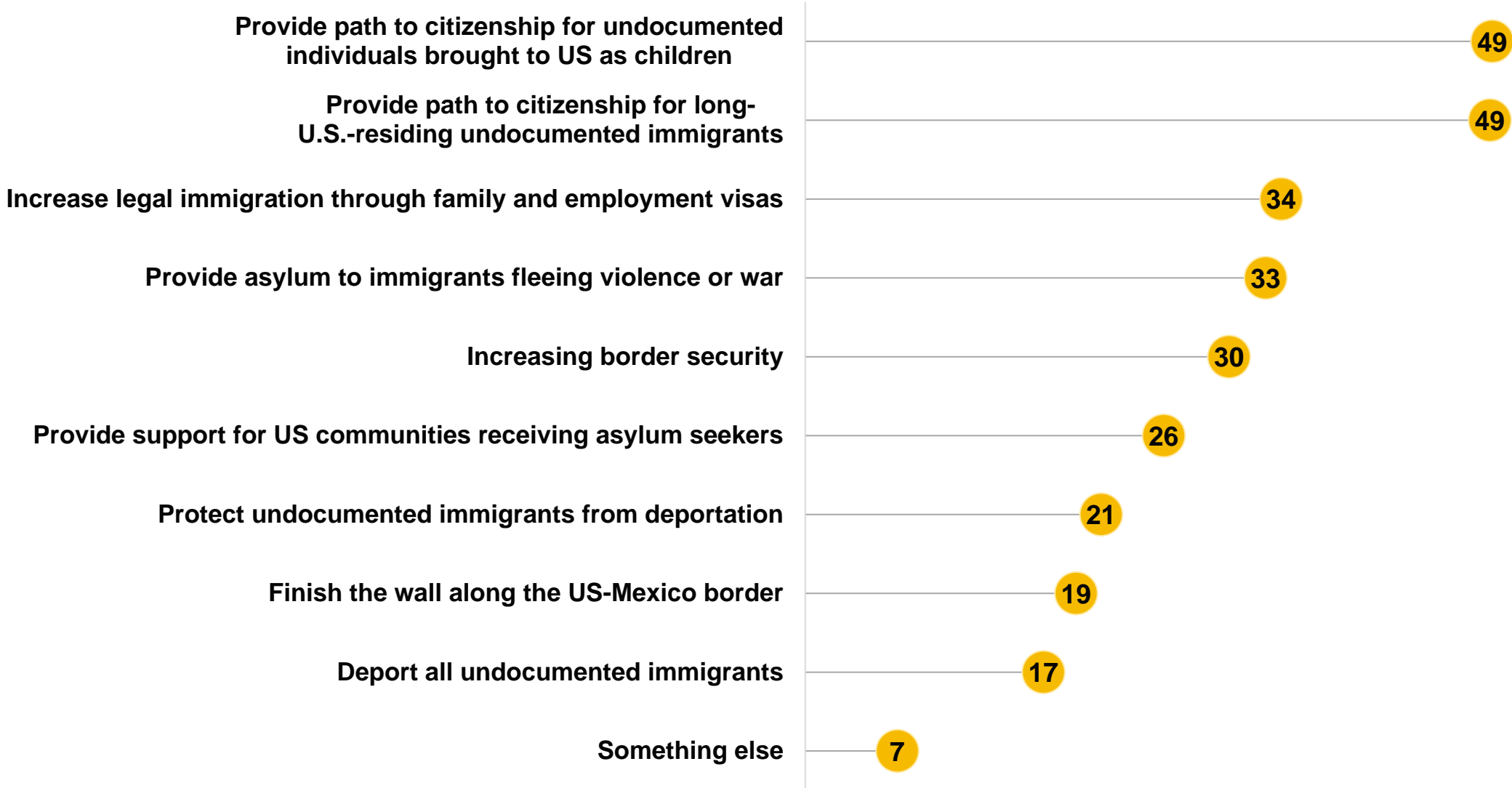
What did you have in mind when you said *health care* is an important issue elected officials should address? (all that apply)

Thinking about the US immigration system, which of the following do you think are the most important issues that elected officials should address? (All that apply. Sorted highest to lowest.)

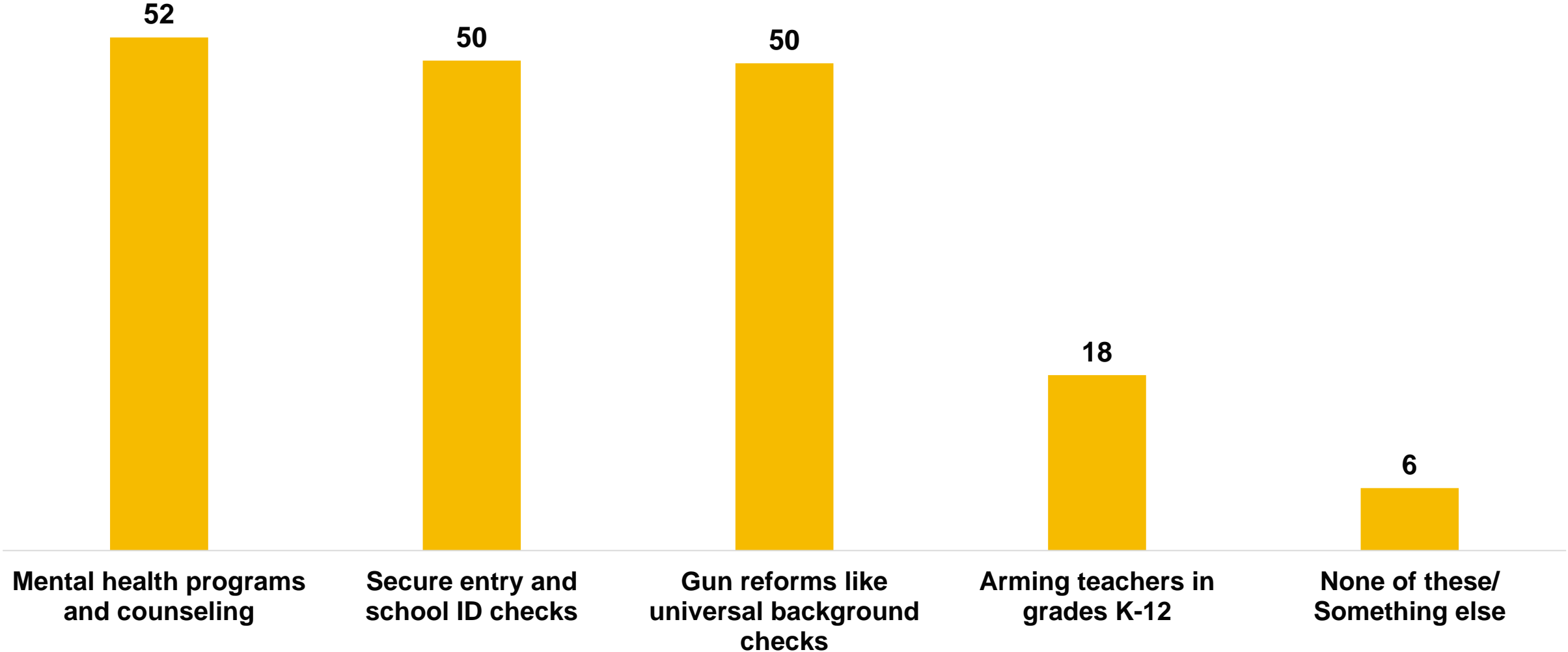

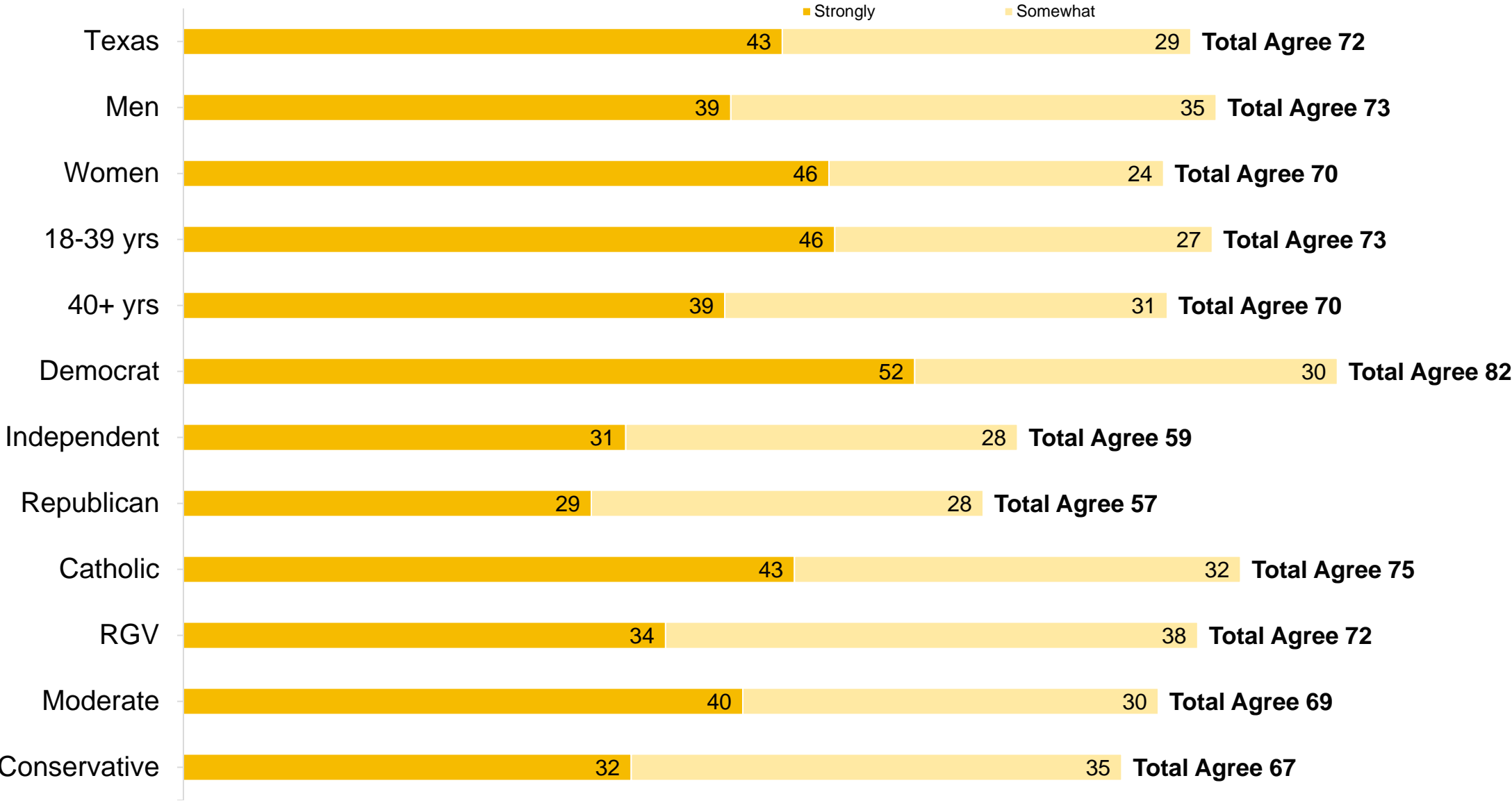

Which policies do you think would be the best solutions to make schools in your community safer for students and teachers? (all that apply)



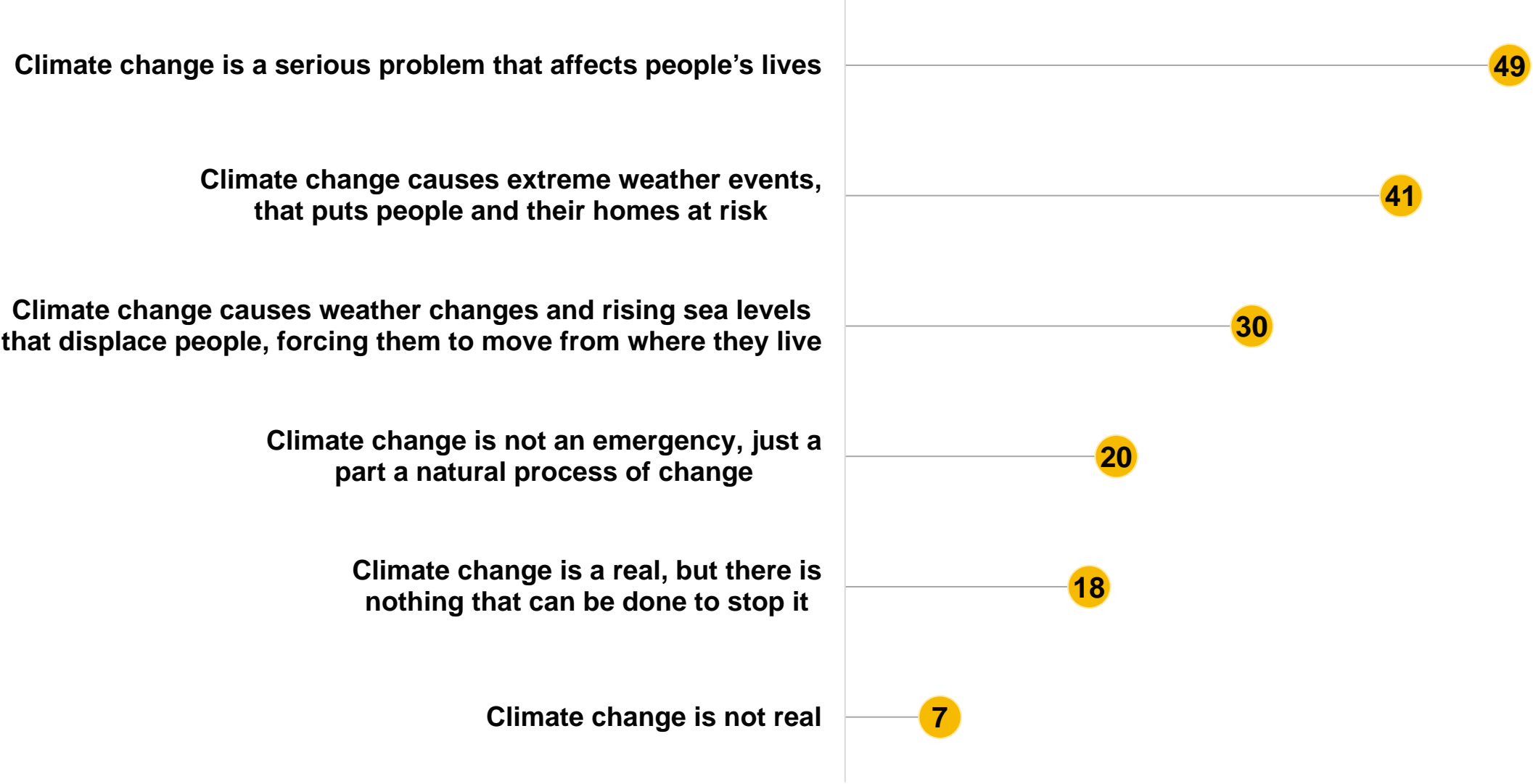

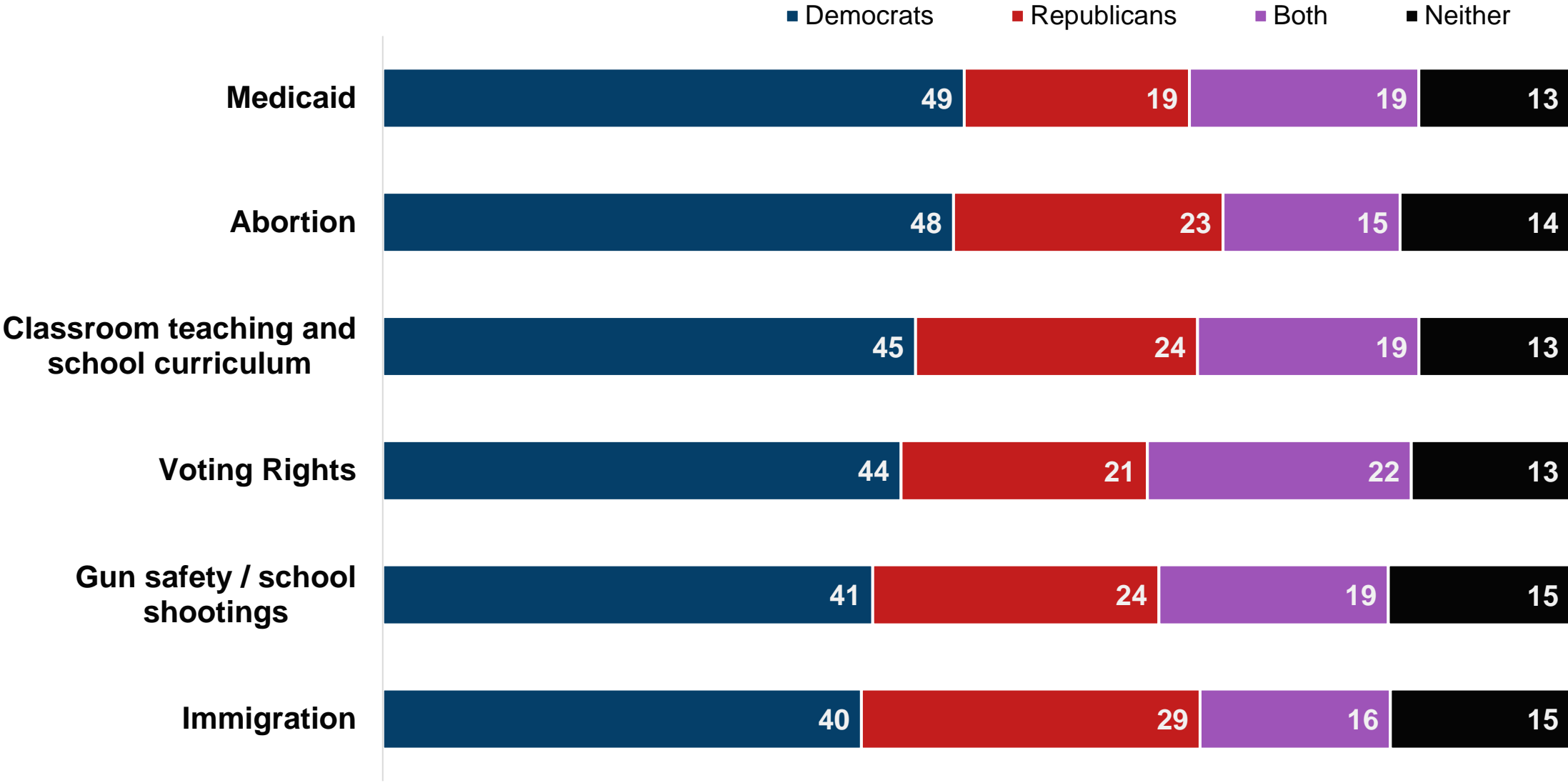

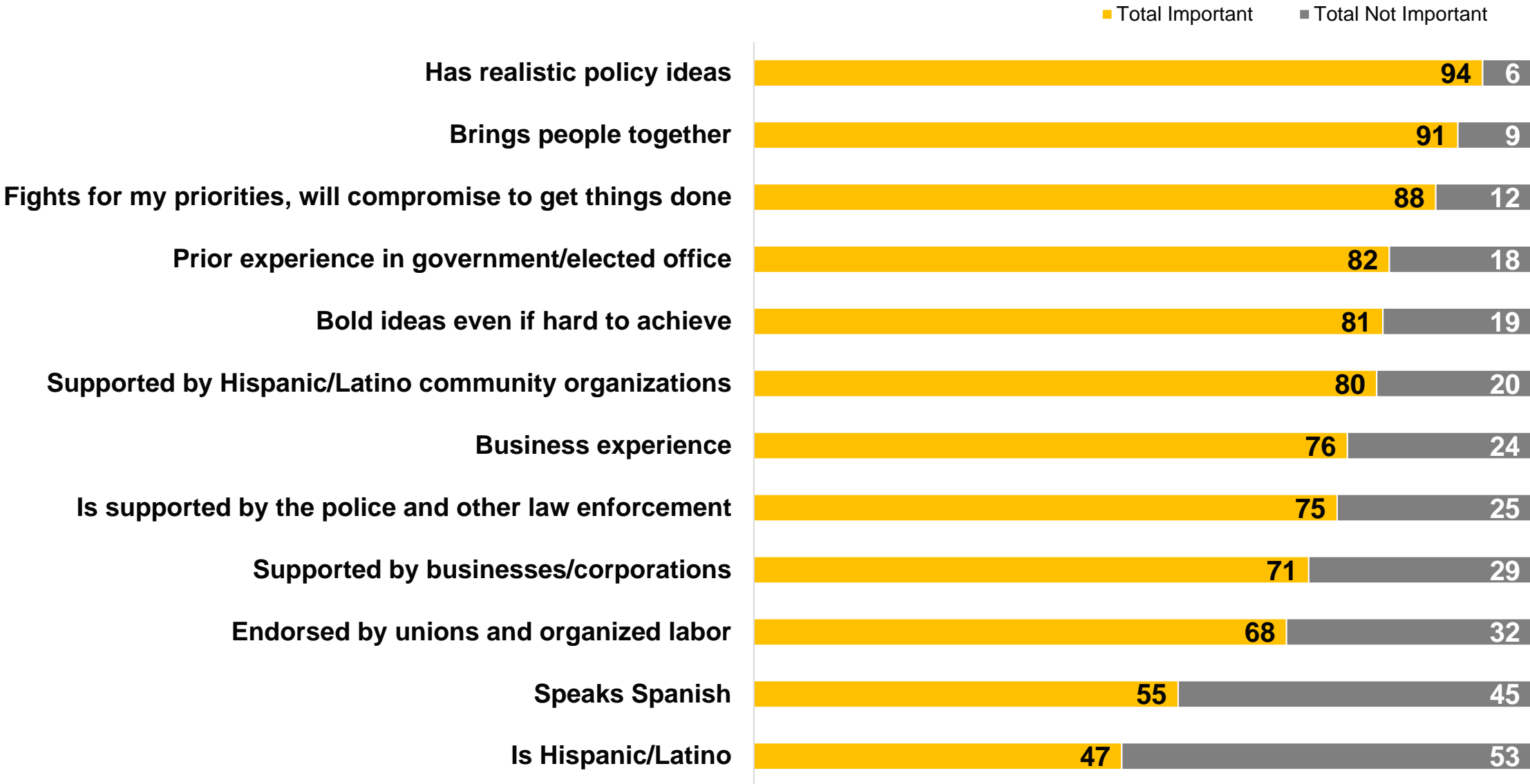

Thinking about the election coming up in November of this year, which party do you think would do a better job handling each of the following issues:



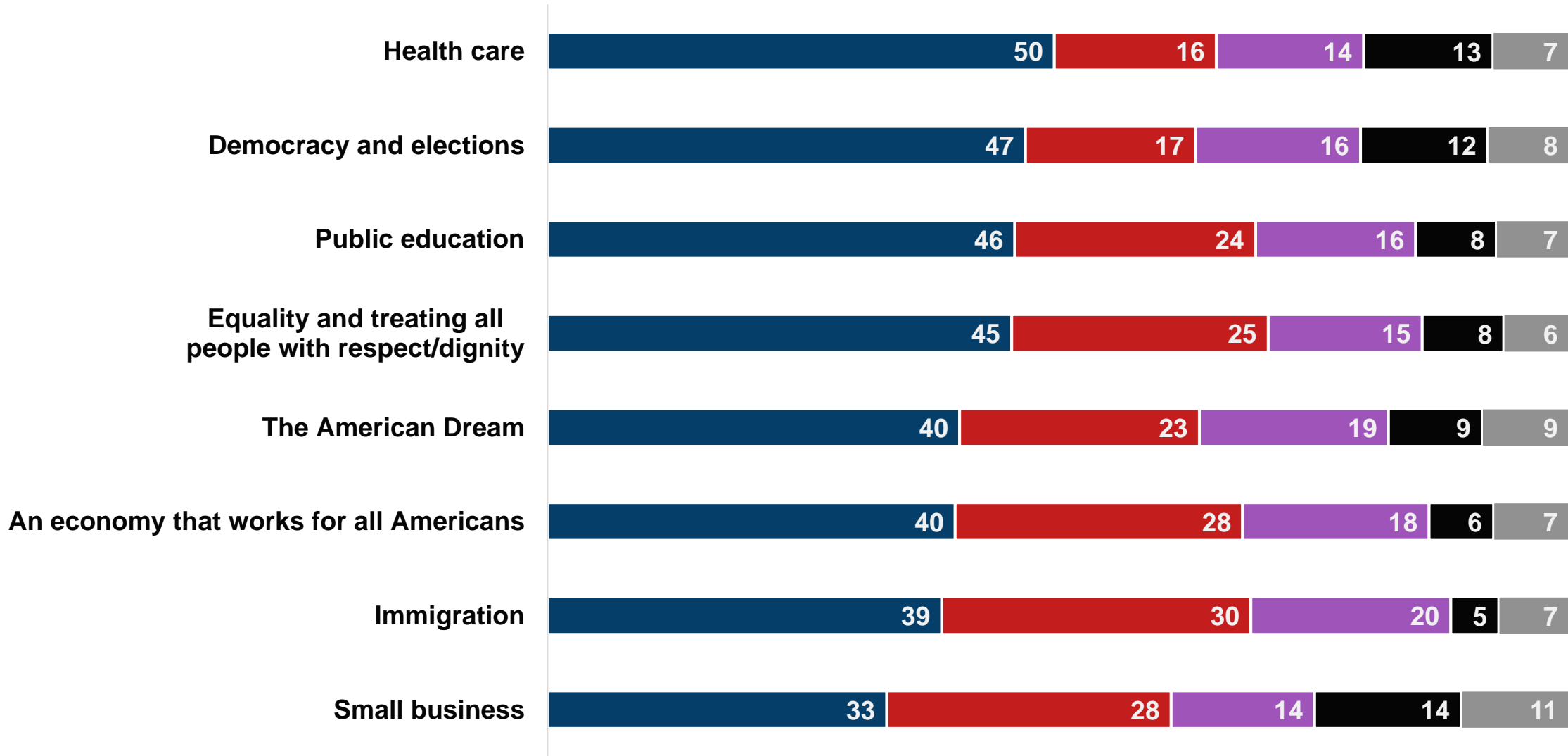

In making decisions about which candidates to support in an election, how important is it to you that a candidate has the following traits or background?



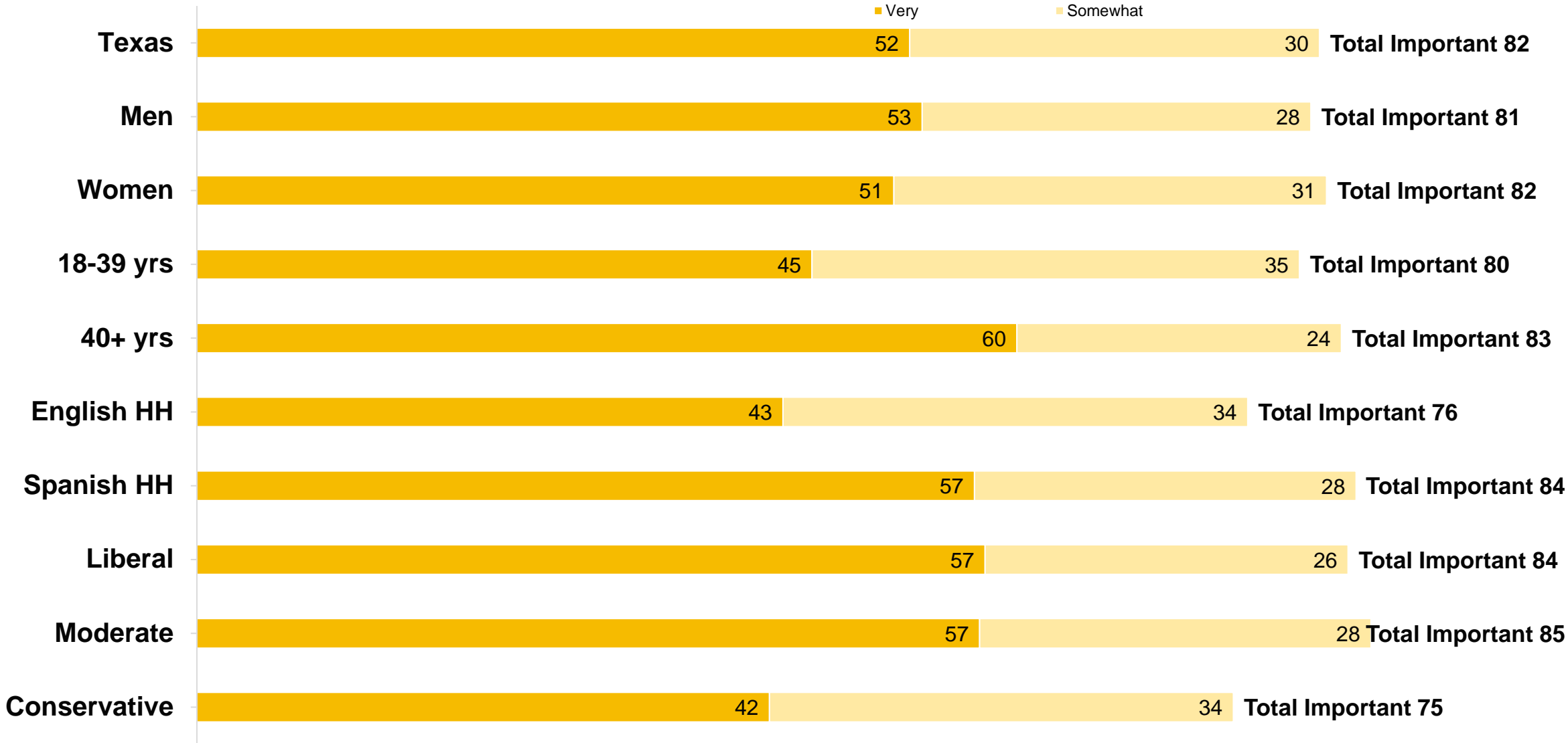
Generally speaking, which party do you believe shares your values, or is closer to your personal beliefs/values when it comes to your views on:

■ Democrats are closer to my views ■ Republicans are closer to my views



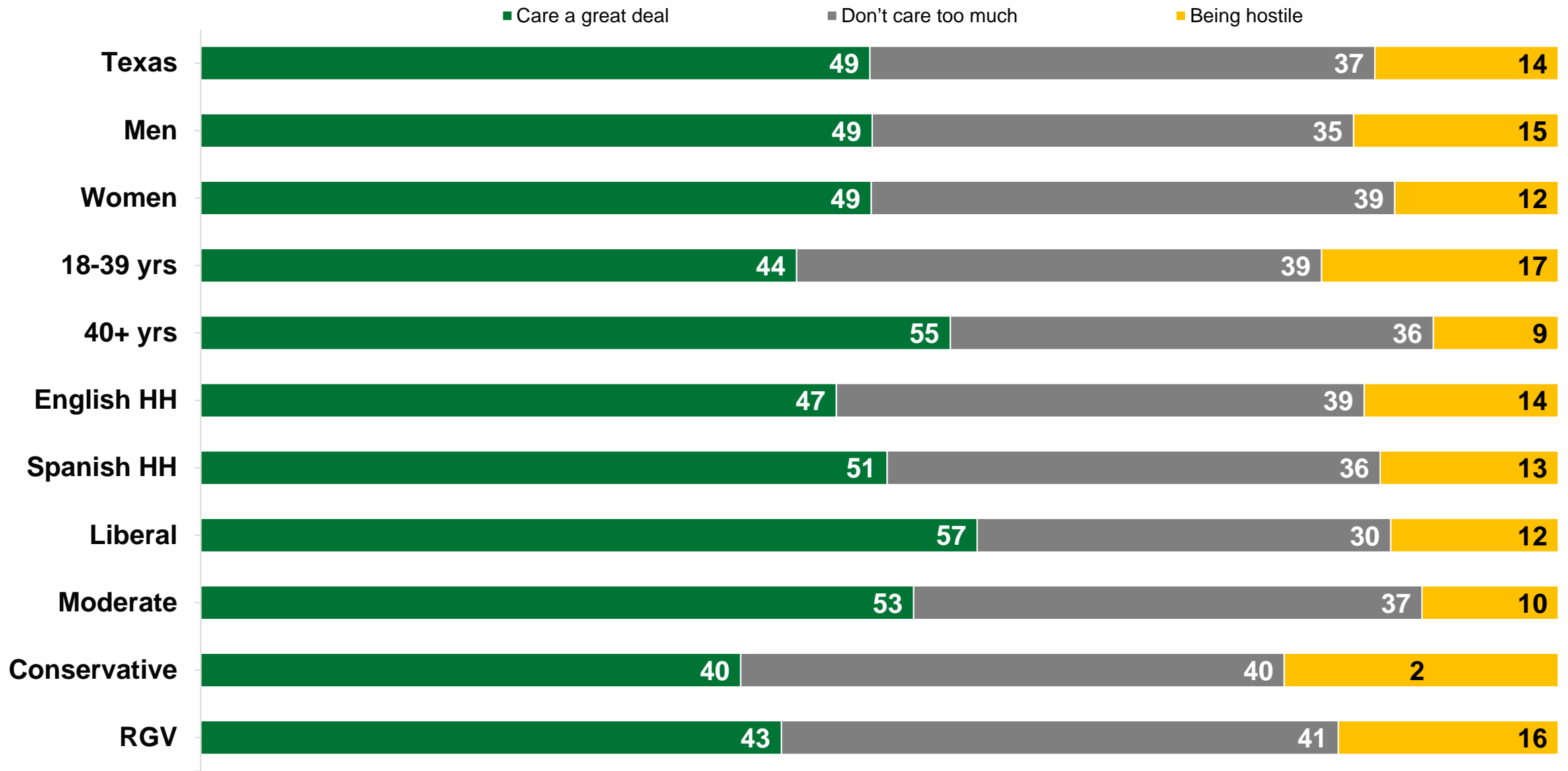

How important is it to you, personally, for elected officials and other leaders to speak out against hate speech, White nationalism and White supremacy? (% important reported)



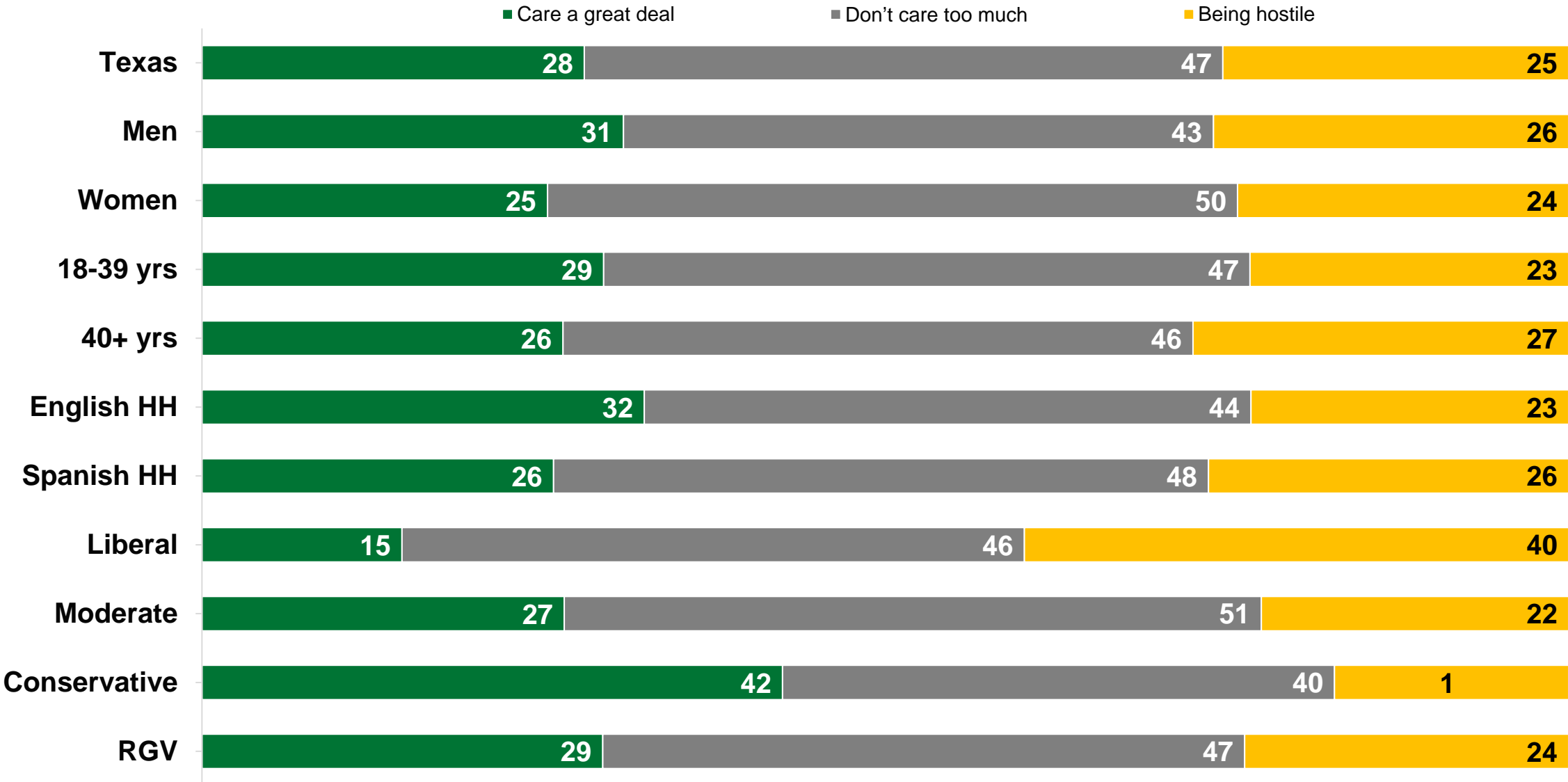

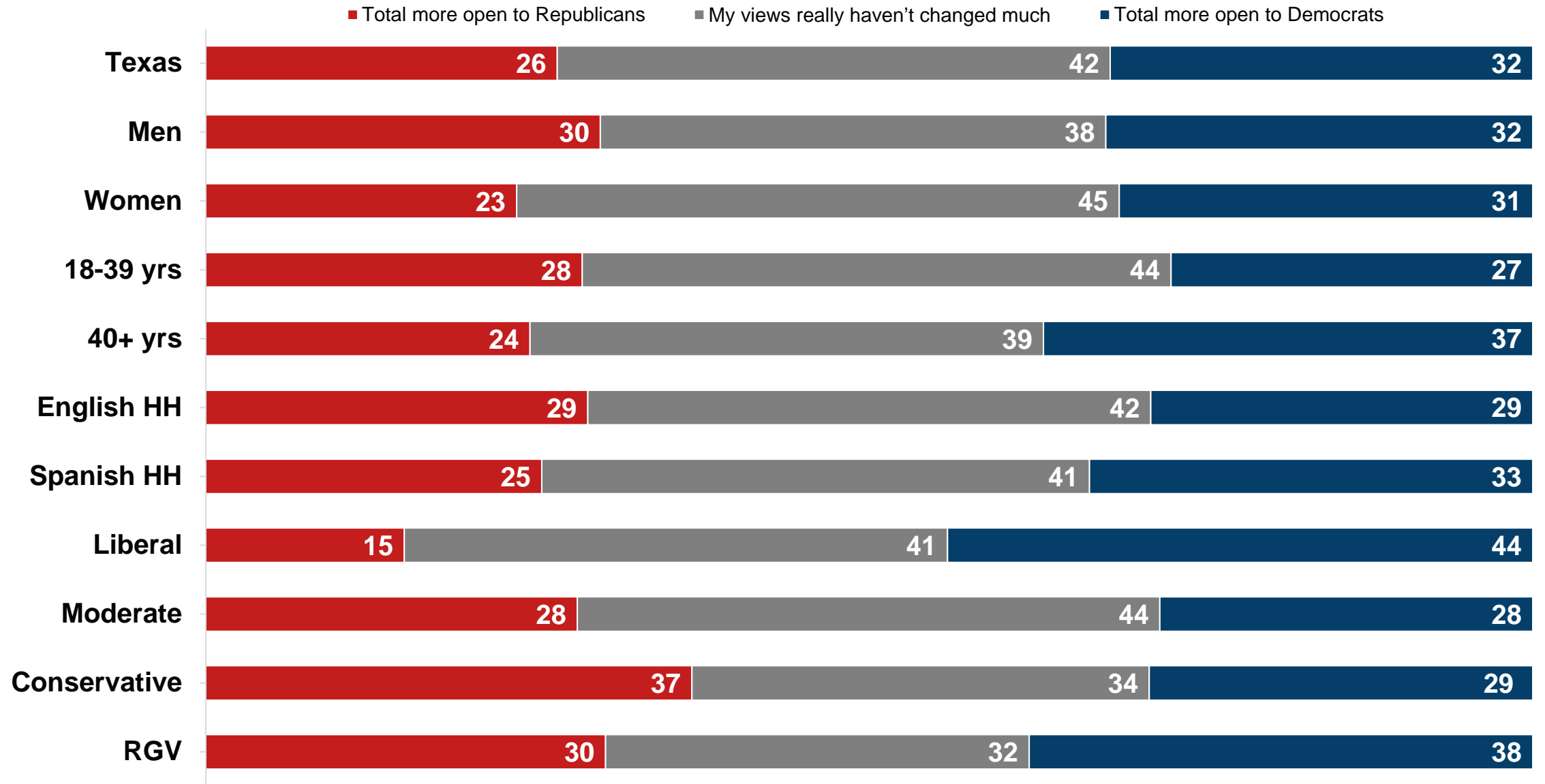

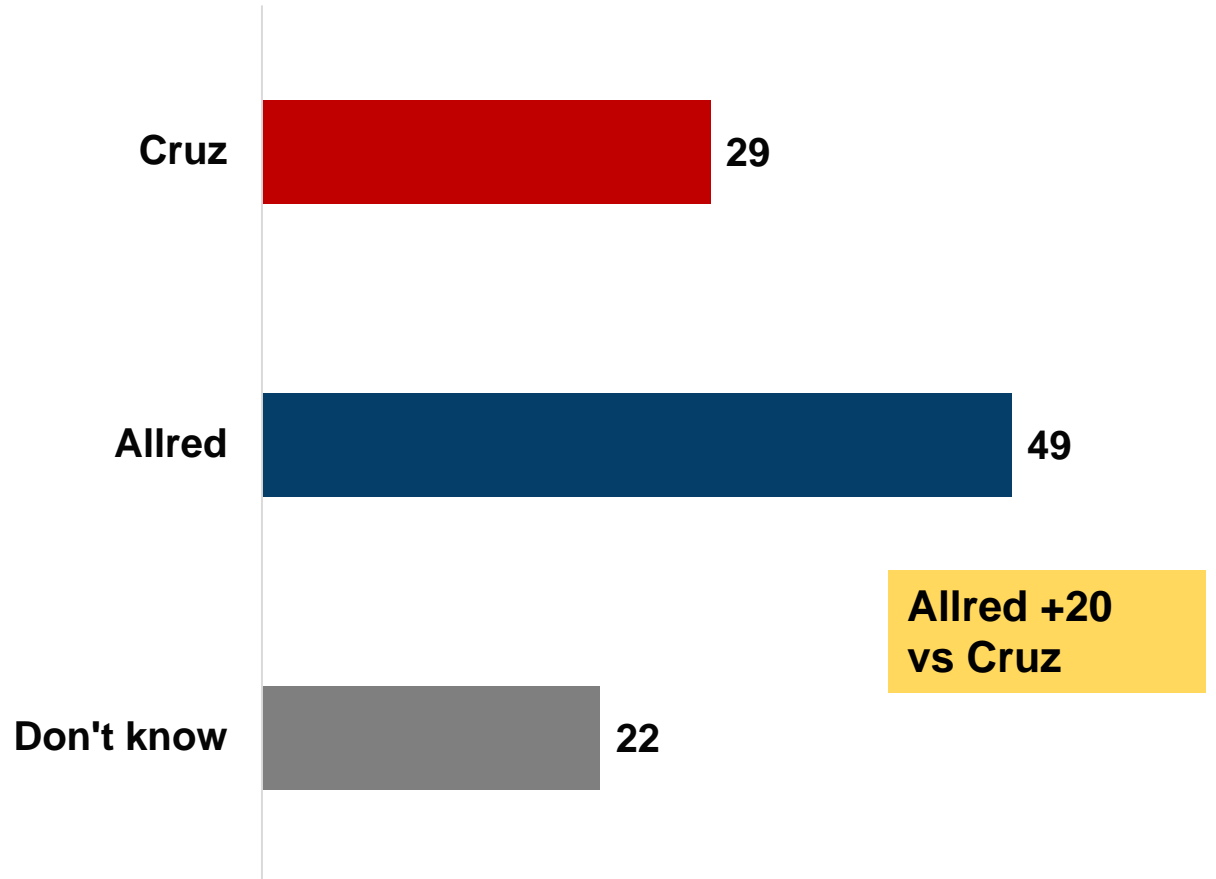

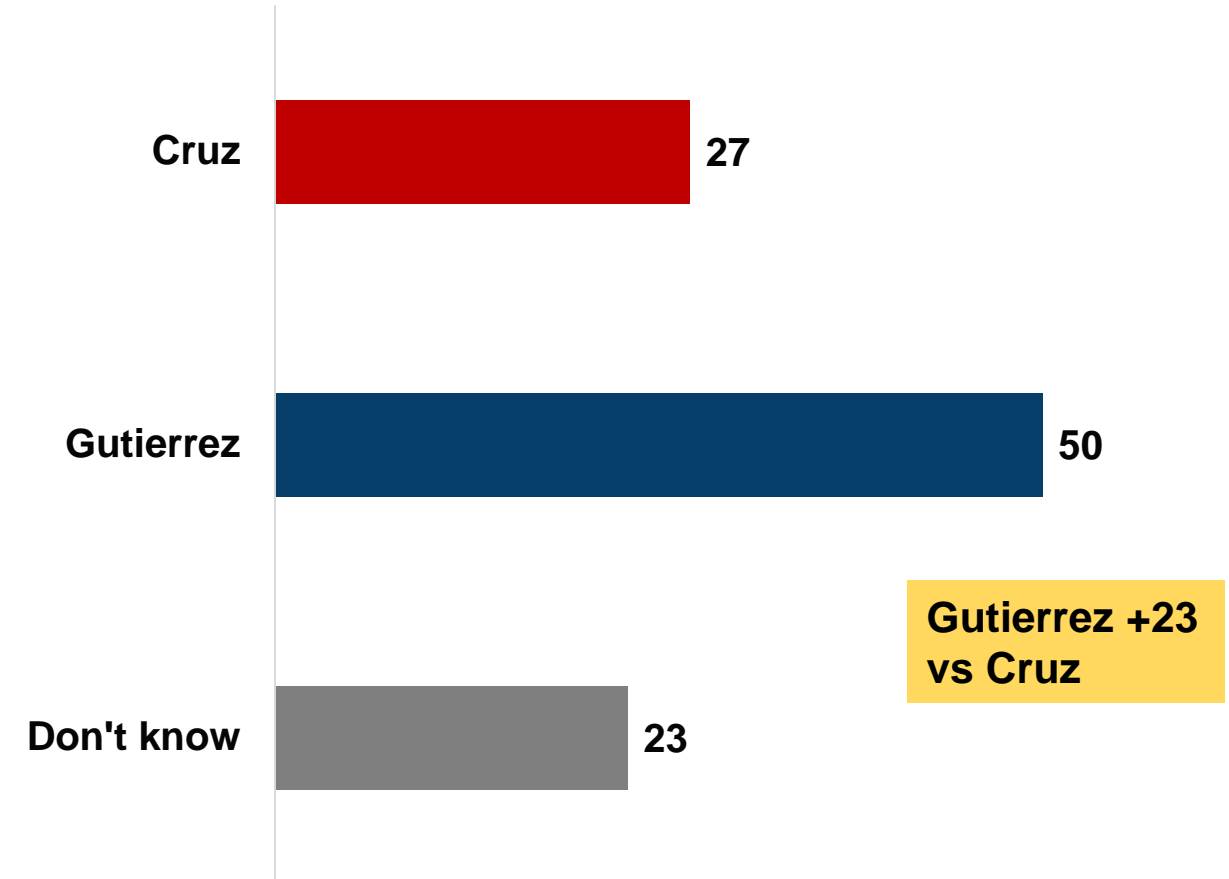

Cruz vs Allred



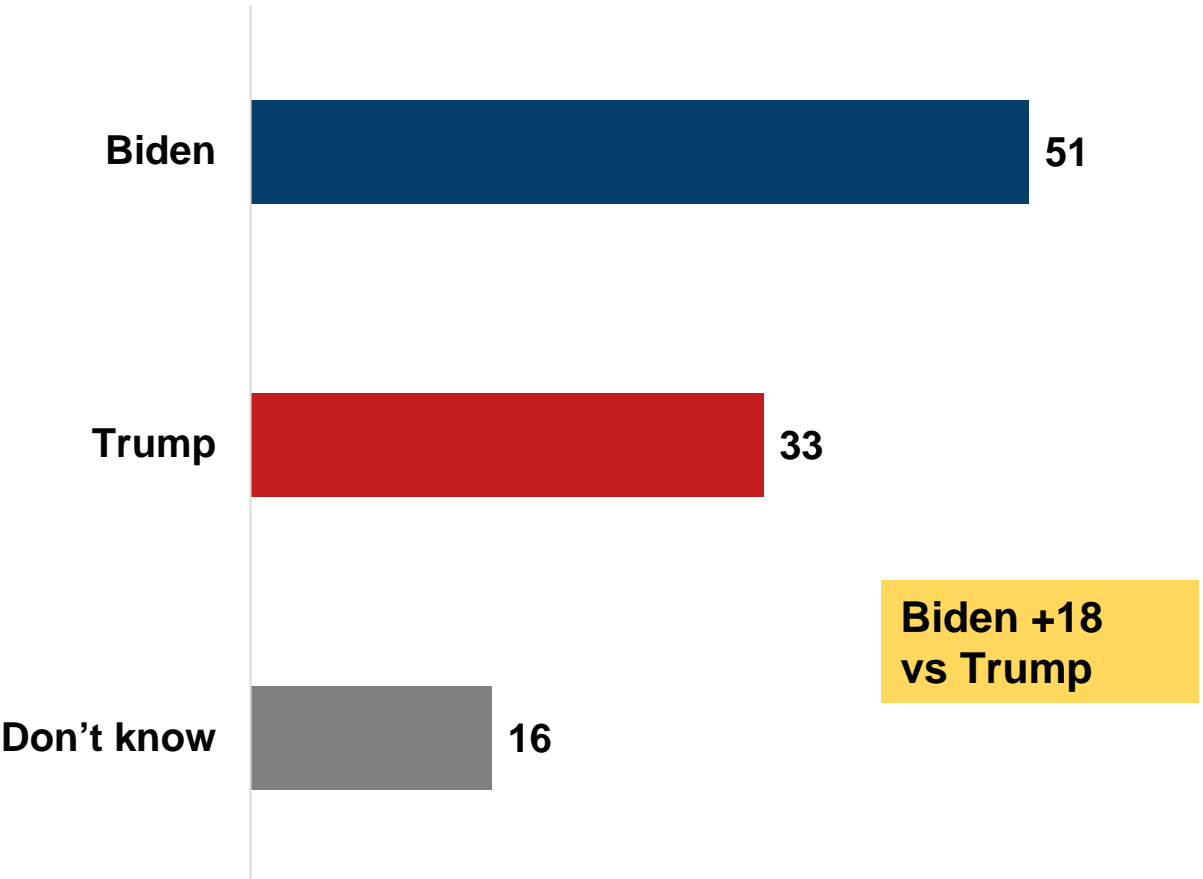
Cruz vs Gutierrez



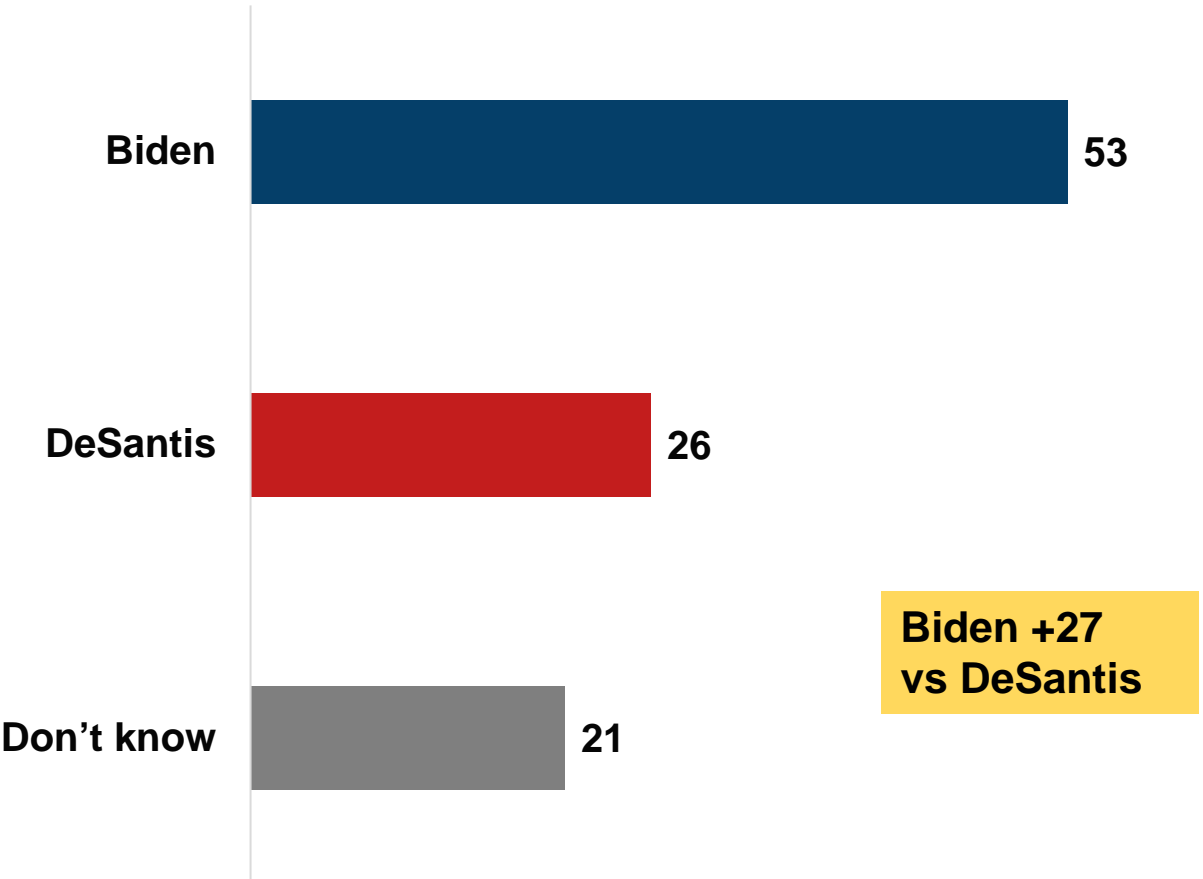

Biden vs Trump

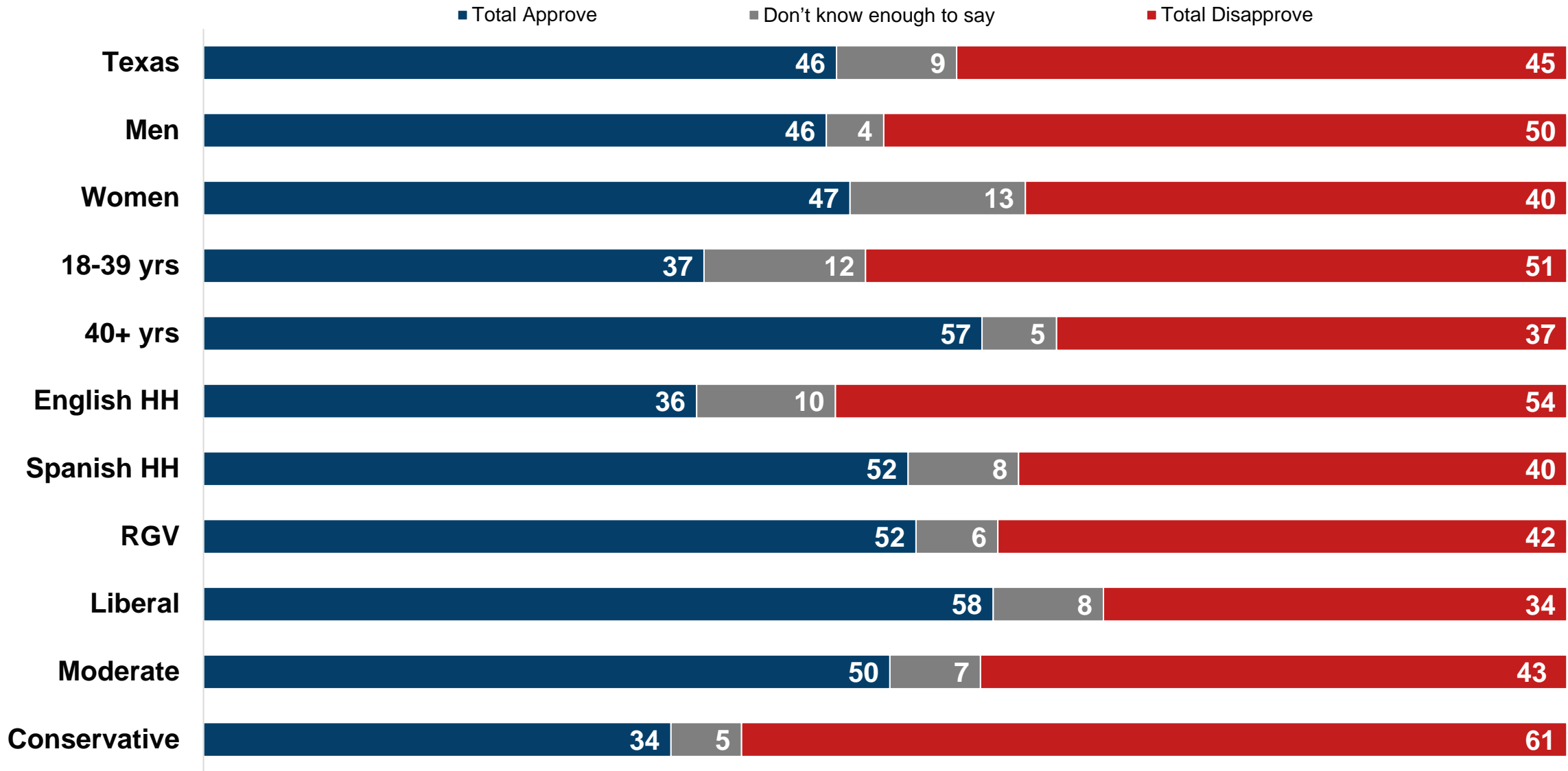


Biden vs DeSantis



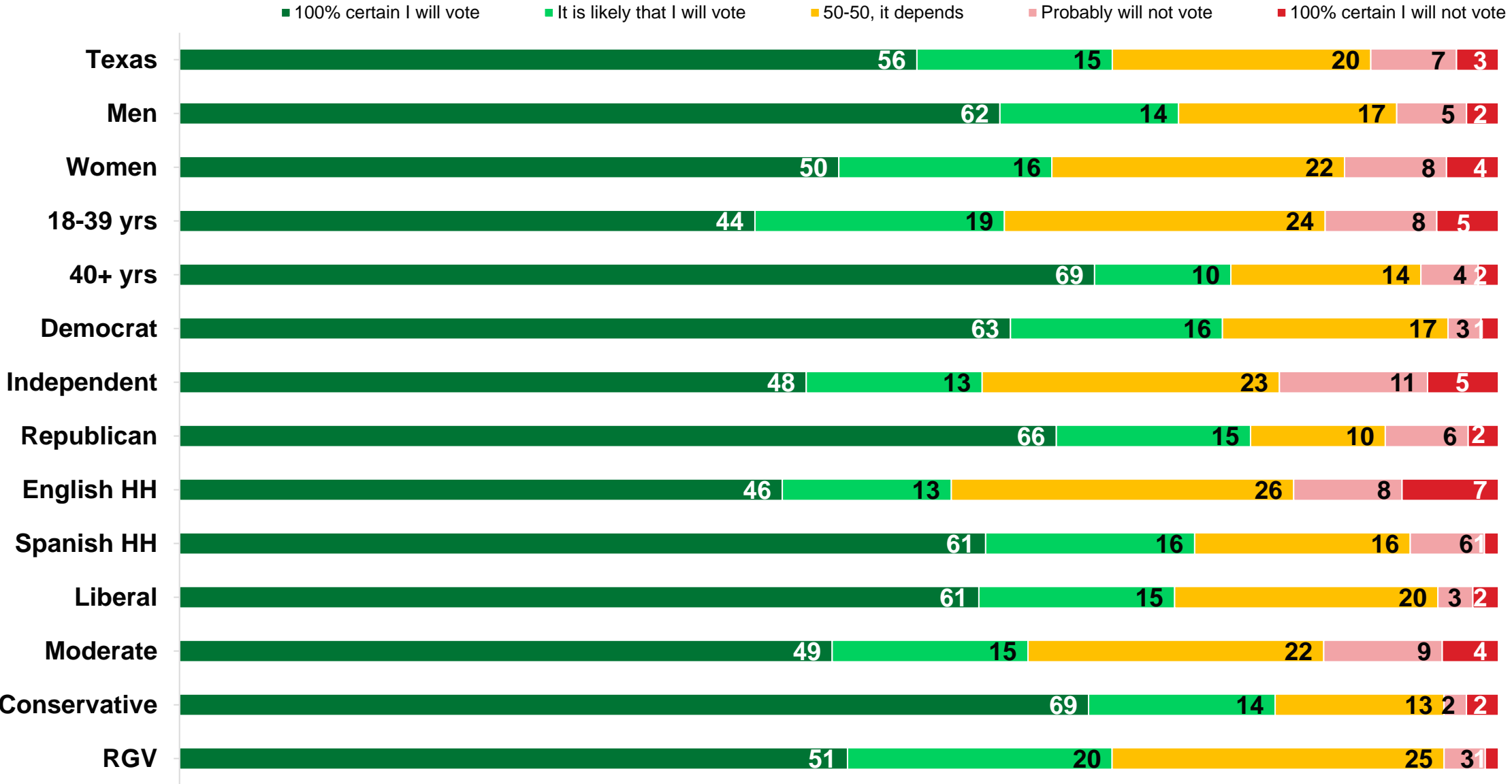
