- **Hispanic Electorate Data Hub:** A data platform that includes multi-year dynamic polling data and detailed insights into the perspectives and priorities of Hispanic voters, including their top issues priorities, their views on parties and candidates and candidate outreach efforts; along with the potential impact of this fast-growing electorate in competitive districts. **AVAILABLE HERE**.
- Bipartisan Poll of Hispanic Voters: The Road to 2026: The largest bipartisan survey of Latino
 registered voters provides an in-depth look at the priorities, political environment, and lived experiences
 shaping the nation's second-largest voting-age population. The 3,000-person national poll, with
 oversamples in six key states and competitive congressional districts. AVAILABLE HERE.
- Latino Voters and Immigration Reform: Polling from the UnidosUS 100-Days Hispanic Voter Poll
 (April 2025) reveals that Latino voters overwhelmingly support firm, fair, and humane immigration
 solutions and vehemently reject harsh enforcement. <u>AVAILABLE HERE.</u>
- **Power of the People Makes a Difference:** UnidosUS showcases community-led campaigns that successfully pressured the administration to release individuals from detention, including U.S. citizens and long-resident immigrants, demonstrating the impact of collective action and rapid-response strategies. <u>AVAILABLE HERE.</u>

- Latino Banking and Financial Health Survey: This survey of 1,200 Latinos in Arizona, California
 and Texas conducted by UnidosUS found that many are stressed about their financial situation and

- Homeownership: Homeownership is the primary pathway to building wealth in America -- and Latino
 families continue to face systemic barriers in achieving it. UnidosUS outlines key policy solutions to close

- Children and Budget Cuts: Federal budget signed into law on July 4 made historical cuts
 to Medicaid and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), endangering health and nutrition
 programs for 34 million children disproportionately affecting Latino and low-income families. UnidosUS
 outlines the devastating impact of these cuts and urges policymakers to protect essential support for
